**AMERICAN RED CROSS, GREATER CLEVELAND  
PROVIDES ASSISTANCE TO MORE THAN 150 PEOPLE IN ONE MONTH**

**Cleveland (July 13, 2007)** - In the past 30 days the American Red Cross, Greater Cleveland Chapter Disaster Action Team (DAT) responded to 24 fires in the Cleveland area, including two apartment fires. The DAT offered assistance to 62 families, providing them with immediate needs. The Greater Cleveland Chapter also provided food and beverage to 40 firefighters who responded to an industrial fire on the city's east side.

The Greater Cleveland Chapter has distributed significantly more resources during this time than a typical month. More than \$25,000 was provided to assist 116 individuals affected by the fires.

The Red Cross also provides tips to prevent fires in your home:

**Be Prepared**

- Replace smoke alarms that are 10 or more years old
- Install smoke alarms inside and outside every sleeping room and on every floor of your home

- Replace smoke alarm batteries twice a year and test the alarms monthly
- Plan two escape routes for each room in your home and make sure every family member is aware of these routes
- Post emergency numbers near every phone in your home
- Do not use candles for lighting if the power goes out; use flashlights only
